possible the items are behaviourally orientated, and inference is reduced to a minimum.

For the purpose of scoring the items are arranged into groups or syndromes. These syndromes represent probably the weakest point of the scales, because they were arrived at by means of a kind of visual cluster analysis which is manifestly inferior to more orthodox procedures, although Dr. Stott, for some reasons which are not obvious, appears to consider it superior. The original data are not given, so that the reader cannot judge as to the adequacy of the analysis. In spite of this very serious shortcoming, which affects the method of scoring used for the guides, these may nevertheless be useful for research purposes in the hands of investigators who have sufficient statistical knowledge to use their own results for deriving proper scoring categories.
