the small bowel and its disorders is commented on and in metabolism and endocrinology the purification, characterization, and synthesis of aldosterone. In haematology Castle picks out Pauling's discovery of sickle-cell haemoglobin, Gross's demonstration of a filtrable factor capable of transmitting mouse leukaemia, and Jacobson's observation that shielding of the spleen facilitates recovery from radiation.

These decennial reviews are well done, but for most of us the attraction of the Year Book of Medicine will remain its skilful skimming of the cream of the research which has been done in clinical medicine in the year that has just ended.
