## HOW TO GIVE UP SMOKING

The Cigarette Habit: A Scientific Cure. By Arthur King. (Pp. 93, 10s. 6d.) Surrey: The World's Work (1913) Ltd. 1962.

This small book, originally published in the United States, is written for laymen in an enthusiastic and journalistic style. Mr. King's cure for smoking begins with a 21-day regime leading to "Q-Day" (Q for quitting), and including successive changes in the brand of cigarette smoked, oral hygiene rituals, contemplative exercises, and note-making. On Q-Day ("Wake up, you've got nothing to do but have fun to-day"), the "addictive" smoker is to start a five-day course of "dexedrine" (dexamphetamine sulphate) and phenobarbitone obtained from his doctor; for the merely "heavy" smoker, caffeine and antihistamine pills available without prescription are thought sufficient. The text contains numerous other suggestions laced with exhortation and encouragement.

It is easy to disparage a contribution of this sort, but while doing so to forget that patients who seek medical help in overcoming the smoking habit tend to find that their doctors have little to offer. This book is more likely to do good than harm in the hands of those smokers who are both firmly convinced of the need to stop the habit and temperamentally disposed to be helped by a routine or schedule. It cannot be more generally recommended, if only because of its dangerous reassurance to "light" and "medium" smokers that their habit is harmless.

Mr. King supplements the exposition of his cure for smoking by a number of general impressions and speculations concerning the tobacco habit. He postulates that "addictive" smoking differs qualitatively from other forms of heavy smoking. In this he may well be right, but his argument draws too confidently upon analogies with alcoholic drinking patterns. He also suggests that addictive smokers may be specifically more susceptible to lung cancer than other smokers. No satisfactory evidence to support this latter hypothesis can either be found in this book or be deduced from available relevant statistics, but the field of inquiry is so important and so widely open that every guess is worth noting.
