tion centres in large cities, including as an experiment a "shop front" centre in one of the Skid Row areas of London.

The tradition of concern about alcoholism is acknowledged by the report, which in its conclusion stresses the need for research as a part of all its new proposals if they are to be more effective than previous attempts. One thing is clear, it adds: alcoholism is unlikely to disappear of its own accord.

# Medical Group of R.P.S.

Under its chairman, Dr. Leslie Bowcock, the Medical Group of the Royal Photographic Society of Great Britain held its annual exhibition of medical photography in the Claire Wand Gallery at B.M.A. House on 4 March. Professor Bryan Brooke, professor of surgery at St. George's Hospital, presented the awards. The following were the award-winners: A.B.P.I. colour trophy, Miss Mary Jackson (rosacea treated by drug therapy); Pharmaceutical Society juniors' trophy, Mr. Richard Summers (disarticulated skull); Medical Group technical award, Miss Julie Dorrington (microtopography of the skin); Medical Group merit awards, Miss Eileen Brown (clinical photography) and Mr. Ray Phillips (facial manifestations in skin disease); B.M.J. award, Mr. Colin Burgess (lighting for convenience); Lancet trophy, Mr. E. J. Harrison (illustrating Clostridium tetani). The exhibition remains open until 22 April. It was announced that Dr. Peter Hansell, director of the departments of medical photography and illustration at the Westminster Hospital Medical School and the Institute of Ophthalmology, has been elected an honorary Fellow of the Royal Photographic Society.

## **Overseas Students**

In the university year 1969-70 there were 17,114 overseas students enrolled for full-time undergraduate or postgraduate studies in British universities. Of these 1,025 were studying medicine: 540 undergraduate and 485 postgraduate. Kenya, Malaysia, Mauritius, Pakistan, Uganda, Hong Kong, and India each had over 50 students in the field of medicine, dentistry, and health. Among countries outside the Commonwealth the largest numbers were from Norway, South Africa, and the U.S.A.

# Plane Tree for R.C.G.P.

On 4 March at a luncheon at the Royal College of General Practitioners, with Dr. G. I. Watson, the president, in the chair, Professor William Gibson of the University of British Columbia presented the college with a seedling plane from the Hippocratic Foundation. It had been grown in Canada from seed from the ancient tree on the island of Cos, and was received on behalf of the college by Dr. R. J. Pinsent. The Greek ambassador was present and gave some soil brought specially from Athens.

### International Health Foundation Award

The Foundation has announced that SF 5,000 will be awarded during 1971 for the best study submitted on "Gonadal Function in the Man between 45 and 55 Years of Age." An additional prize of SF 2,000 for the best paper by an author under 35 may be awarded if the quality of entries permits. Papers
