

ments in their district and have access to A.H.A. members and officers. The councils will report their activities to the public, and A.H.A.s will be required to publish answers to the reports and declare what action has been taken on the recommendations made. At least half of the C.H.C.'s members will be appointed by local authorities and at least one-third by voluntary organizations. The remaining members of the English councils will be appointed by the relevant R.H.A., after consultation with local authorities and other bodies, and of the Welsh councils by the Secretary of State for Wales after consultation with local authorities—these members will include nominees from organizations not otherwise represented.

### Specialist Training: F.C.M.

The Faculty of Community Medicine of the Royal Colleges of Physicians of the United Kingdom is preparing recommendations on specialist training for the Joint Committee on Higher Medical Training (*B.M.J.*, 11 November 1972, p. 375). Until the discussions are completed doctors preparing for the membership examination by attendance at full or part-time courses, those holding trainee medical officer posts with regional hospital boards, or trainees engaged in full-time non-clinical training for community medicine will have such training taken into account. The Education Committee will be prepared to advise on the suitability of posts for higher specialist training early in 1974.

### Sir Keith Joseph Discusses Consultant Problems

Representatives of the Central Committee for Hospital Medical Services met the Secretary of State for Social Services, Sir Keith Joseph, on 30 January to discuss the problems facing N.H.S. consultants. The profession's delegation was led by Dr. C. E. Astley, Chairman, C.C.H.M.S., and included Mr. A. H. Grabham, Mr. R. Myles Gibson, and Dr. E. B. Lewis. Among the subjects discussed were reform of the consultant contract and family planning services in N.H.S. hospitals. Sir Keith has agreed to a further meeting, which will be held shortly.
