Pressures on Geriatric Hospitals

Doctors, nurses, and patients at Ruchill Hospital, Glasgow, were struggling against unsatisfactory physical conditions aggravated by shortage of experienced staff. These conditions were to blame for many of the defects in the service provided by the hospital, says the report of a committee of inquiry set up to examine allegations about the running of the hospital that were made at and after the trial of Sister McTavish on criminal charges arising from the death of patients. (Ruchill Hospital. A Report to the Greater Glasgow Health Board; Mr. Simpson Stevenson, chairman).

The report criticizes communications within and between the professions and found evidence of problems of morale and leadership. It recommends that a procedure should be introduced to alert district executive groups whenever nurse staffing in a hospital falls below a fixed danger level and that in future geriatric units should not be set up without proper assessment of the physical conditions and staffing arrange-ments. "It is hard to believe," says the ments. "It is hard to believe," says the report, "that the full implications of the proportion of health resources now required to care for the elderly have been fully appreciated by the health care professions.'
