### Health priorities

On 24 March the Department of Health published Priorities for Health and Personal Social Services in England, a Consultative Document (HMSO, £1.60). In her introduction Mrs Barbara Castle states that her intention is to give health and local authorities more say in planning but that the document sets out her proposals for broad policy guidelines. The main proposals are based on giving current expenditure priority over the building programme, so allowing a 1.8-2% annual increase in expenditure on the NHS and social services. Within the NHS, services for the elderly and mentally handicapped would be given priority over acute and general hospital services, and expenditure on the hospital maternity services would fall by 1.8% per year. These proposals are based on projections by the Office of Population Censuses and Surveys that between 1973 and 1985 there would be a drop in the numbers of children aged 5-15 and a levelling off of the birth rate.

#### Postgraduate courses

Details of the medical courses and diplomas offered by British universities and postgraduate institutes, and open to both British and overseas graduates, are given in the latest issue of Summary of Postgraduate Diplomas and Courses in Medicine. This edition has been revised by the BMA Commonwealth and International Bureau, but responsibility for its publication has now been taken over by the Council for Postgraduate Medical Education. ### Chair of anaesthesia, Glasgow

Dr Donald Campbell has been appointed to the chair of anaesthesia in Glasgow University, from a date to be arranged. Dr Campbell graduated from Glasgow in 1952, and after house appointments there he spent three years in Canada. He returned to Glasgow in 1956 to the Royal Infirmary and then Stobhill General Hospital. In 1960 Dr Campbell was appointed lecturer in anaesthesia at Glasgow University, and in 1961 he became consultant anaesthetist at the Royal Infirmary. Dr Campbell is a member of the council of the Association of Anaesthetists of Great Britain and Ireland and of their research committee, a founder member of the Scottish Standing Committee of the Faculty of Anaesthetists of the Royal College of Surgeons of England, and an examiner for the College's Fellowship in Anaesthesia. His main research interests are clinical pharmacology in anaesthesia and respiratory intensive care.
