introduce the necessary legislation without further delay." The committee received advice from the BMA's solicitor on possible ways of safeguarding the position of GPs in relation to private practice from health centres in the light of the Health Services Bill published last week (see p 1024). A report of the committee's proceedings will be published in a future issue.

NHS statistics

The total hospital medical staff in Great Britain in 1974 was 31 473. This represents an increase of 38% over the figure for 1966. The total of general practitioners was 25 849, an increase over the 1966 figure of 800. The hospital specialties with the largest numbers of consultant staff were anaesthetics (1358), general medicine (980), mental illness (930), and general surgery (885). Between 1968-9 and 1973-4 the total cost of national health and welfare services doubled, from £1793m to £3603m.

In England in 1974 local authorities provided residential accommodation for 118 289 persons. Of these, 91% were aged 65 and over. Over 91 000 children were in the care of local authorities, an increase of 9% since 1971. About 20° of these were over compulsory school age. Local authorities provided help in the supply and installation of 2500 television sets and in the payment of an additional 6500 television licences in 1974. They also helped in the installation of 900 radio sets.—Health and Personal Social Services Statistics for England, 1975 (Department of Health and Social Security, HMSO, £3.80 net).

Forensic psychiatric hospital

A regional forensic psychiatric hospital is planned by the South-west Thames Regional Health Authority for mentally ill and mentally handicapped patients in that region who need a limited period of treatment under secure conditions. The aim is to provide comprehensive care and treatment for men and women for whom there are at present no suitable facilities. There will be provision for outpatients, and assessments will also be undertaken to help the courts.

The Butler Committee on Abnormal Offenders recommended that there should be secure units in NHS hospitals and, as a result, the Secretary of State has urged all regional health authorities to take action on this recommendation. The DHSS will make a special allocation for the cost of the new hospital.

Personal chair in surgery, King's College Hospital Medical School

Mr V V Kakkar has been appointed to a personal chair in the department of surgery at King's College Hospital Medical School. Mr Kakkar, who is 39, graduated from Vikram University in 1960. After house appointments in Kent and Oxford, he joined the department of surgery at King's College Hospital in 1965. In 1968 he was appointed lecturer and in 1973 senior lecturer and honorary consultant surgeon. Mr Kakkar is also director of the thrombosis research unit at King's College Hospital and his main research interests are in thromboembolic disease.

International Society of Hypertension

At the meeting held in Sydney, Australia, in February, Dr J I S Robertson was elected president, Professor A Zanchetti vice president, and Dr W H Birkenhäger secretary of the Society. The Volhard Award and lectureship was awarded to Dr F B Byrom and the Merck Sharp and Dohme International Award to the Howard Florey Institute of Experimental Physiology and Medicine, Melbourne. The retiring president, Professor F Gross, has taken up chairmanship of the Scientific Board of the International Society of Cardiology.
