The social services

The Personal Social Services Council, the independent body that advises the Government on social services policy, has warned the Government that without additional resources local authorities will not maintain the standards of the social services. Commenting on the DHSS discussion document The Way Forward (published in September 1977), the council pointed out that the strategy outlined in the preceding consultative document of 1976 was not being carried out. Resources were not being transferred from the acute and general hospital sector to priority groups (such as the elderly, the mentally handicapped, and the mentally ill) or to community care, and capital spending in community health and the personal social services had been further reduced; moreover, the costs of residential services were rising.
