described as a biting insect. This book achieves its object and for those who like their information in this form it is recommended.

SENSORY APHASIA

Sensory Aphasia and Amusia. The Myeloarchitectonic Basis. By Professor K. Kleist. Translated by F. J. Fish and J. B. Stanton. (Pp. 95+xv; illustrated. 30s.) Oxford, London, New York, Paris: Pergamon Press. 1962.

These lectures were given by the late Dr. Kleist but a few years ago and have already been published in German. Dr. Kleist is best known for his work on brain wounds of the first world war, and these studies were often characterized by an attempt to attribute special functions to small areas of the cerebral cortex of, say, the post-central gyrus. This trait is very evident in these lectures where a detailed cytoarchitectural and myeloarchitectural study of the temporal-lobe cortex precedes the anatomical description of the lesions found at necropsy in some interesting cases of sensory aphasia.

The trouble arises when attempts are made to correlate the lesion with the symptoms, for most students of aphasia will reject the ideas underlying the statement (p. 89), "... Comprehension of names can be allotted to the subregio caudodorsalis." This attempt to parcel out small areas of the cortex in relation to complex speech processes is out of sympathy with present-day thought on the physiology of speech.
