Oddly the book deals last with the types of radiation and their measurements. Though scalers and ratemeters are rather taken for granted this final section covers ionization chambers, G.M. tubes, scintillation counters, pulse-height analysers, and health physics and is easy reading. A skim through this second half would help orient a tyro about to enter an isotope laboratory. But even a skim through the first or applied section has less to commend it. This gives full details of certain techniques used for thyroid or haematological studies and for scanning for isotope concentration into tumours, and so on, but no wider glance is given beyond the techniques used at the Bethesda Naval Centre, which many authorities would not advise. Most of these chapters open with packaged physiology often presented in staccato fashion by means of lists and complex schematic diagrams and these are often irrelevant to the isotope tests, whose physiological implications are rarely adequately covered.

Sarcomas of the alimentary tract are not common and the smooth muscle tumours, leiomyomas and leiomyosarcomas, are certainly very rare. It may seem surprising, therefore, that a book of more than 400 pages should be devoted to them, yet Drs. Skandalakis, Gray, Shepard, and Bourne have produced such a book, including a review of 2,525 cases.

Actually this is little more than a review of the literature of the subject and a bibliography of previously reported cases. Only the first 36 pages of the book are devoted to the origin and pathology of these tumours. The whole of the remainder, no less than 430 pages, is a tabulated index or guide to previously published cases.

The book has little value except as a work of reference for any new observer who wishes to find out what has already been published about these rare tumours.

In his judgment Mr. Justice Veale found that a double dislocation had in fact taken place, despite his finding that the acetabulum appeared sufficiently deep to maintain stability of the hip and despite the evidence that a recurrent dislocation was very rare. In view of the severe (and, in the judge's opinion, startling) conflict of medical evidence, it would have been an easy way out for the court to have found simply that the plaintiff had failed to prove his case on the balance of probabilities (the standard of proof required in a civil action). However, the court took a bold course and accepted as true the evidence that this was an exceptional case where the unexpected happened.

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# **Vital Statistics**

#### **Scottish Health Statistics**

In 1961 Scotland's infant mortality rate was 25 per 1,000 births. Twenty years before it was 82.7. The neonatal mortality rate was 17.9 per 1.000 live births and the stillbirth rate was 20.8 per total live and stillbirths. All three Notifications of 1961 rates were new low records. tuberculosis were 3,036, less than half the figure of 7,776 in 1951. Consequently beds for the treatment of tuberculosis in Scotland have fallen by more than one-half since 1951, and numbered 2.843 at the end of 1961. Deaths from tuberculosis (all forms) were 481 in 1961 and 2,279 in 1951. Of the 103.316 live and stillbirths in Scotland in 1961, 75% of the mothers were delivered in hospital (or private maternity homes). The percentage of women delivered in hospital has gradually risen from 67 in 1951.-Scottish Health Statistics 1961, 1962, H.M.S.O., Edinburgh. Price £1 5s. net.
