INTRODUCTION TO BIOMETEOROLOGY

Medical Biometeorology. By S. W. Tromp. (Pp. 991+xxvii; illustrated. Dutch florins 120.) Amsterdam, London, and New York: Elsevier Publishing Co. 1963.

This volume, from a non-medical author, is intended as an introduction to biometeorology, with special reference to its medical and physiological aspects, and as such it brings up to date the work of Huntingdon, Petersen, De Rudder, and others before the second world war. The meteorological sections and discussion on methods of study and their limitations are the best features of the book. The physiological and medical sections suffer from a confusing mass of detail without adequate distinction between well-established fact and slender evidence. The book can be recommended for its excellent classified bibliography, containing 4,400 references.

MEDICAL HISTORY ON THE GRAND SCALE

A Short History of Medicine. By Charles Singer and E. Ashworth Underwood. Second edition. (Pp. 854+xv; illustrated. 63s.) Oxford: Clarendon Press. 1962.

Charles Singer published A Short History of Medicine in 1928. Written by a medical scholar of his eminence it received an enthusiastic reception, and in successive reprintings he made minor alterations in the text. He fully realized that the advances in medical history and the phenomenal discoveries in medical knowledge of latter

years called for extensive revision of the book. This task he entrusted to Dr. Underwood, who has accomplished it with erudition, accuracy, and characteristic thoroughness.

Dr. Underwood's first intention was to preserve the original form of the book, and from prehistoric times up to the end of the eighteenth century this has been done, though many alterations and additions have been made. But to do even scant justice to the modern period of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries he was compelled to write a new historical account, so that two-thirds of the present work is completely new. It is gratifying to know that Professor Singer was able to read the proofs before his death and to make helpful comments upon them.

This is a comprehensive and authoritative history of medicine on the grand scale, and in view of its magnitude can hardly now be regarded as a "short" history.

Some histories of medicine either ignore or briefly refer to the great contributions public health and preventive medicine have made to medical progress. Dr. Underwood's past experience as a progressive medical officer of health is revealed in his admirable accounts of the revolution in preventive medicine, of epidemiology, and of the value of statistics. Some factual errors in a work of this wide scope are inevitable, but can easily be rectified in future editions. There is a good index and a weighty list of selected references. The torch of medical history that Professor Singer handed to Dr. Underwood burns with renewed brilliance in this great work.
