

as beef, chicken, and egg the corresponding prices are 342, 364, and 465 cents. Presumably the low price of protein from skim-milk may be partly explained by the production of milk in some parts of the world mainly for making butter, which leaves large amounts of skim-milk for drying or feeding to farm stock. Efforts to increase the production of skim-milk without an assured market for the butter might therefore increase its price.

Unconventional sources of protein, such as green leaves, the alga *Chlorella*, or yeast grown on paraffin fractions obtained during petroleum refinery, may therefore be important for future development. Perhaps even more important, however, is the prevention of the loss of protein foods by the lack of adequate storage facilities. Much of the world's food grain is lost because of faulty storage. Large proportions of green vegetables, fish, etc., are either wasted or devoted to livestock feeding because they cannot be stored. Unfortunately most of this wastage occurs in countries which are short of protein foods and can least afford it. Other topics reviewed are transport, marketing, consumption problems, and education in nutrition. In many developing countries the co-operation of Governments is needed to ensure, by the subsidized distribution of protein-rich food at health centres and schools, that the requirements of the vulnerable groups are satisfied.

The publication of this booklet should be useful in providing those in key positions in governmental and public-health services with a wealth of information in a readily assimilable form.

Greenberg Memorial

Studies in Epidemiology. Selected Papers of Morris Greenberg, M.D. (Pp. 418+xxviii; illustrated. \$8.50.) New York: G. P. Putnam. 1965.

Sentimental rather than practical values may be the determining factors in the publication of some memorial volumes. Whether the associates and students of a teacher, who must be influenced by his personality, can make comparative judgment of his work is open to doubt. The really first-class teacher may make very little original contribution to his science, but because of his appreciation of the significance of the discoveries of others he may be more important academically than the research worker whose discovery may lapse into oblivion without the teacher. Although sentiment played a part in the production of this memorial volume to Dr.

Morris Greenberg, it contains articles based on sound epidemiology.

The papers or précis of papers are grouped under the headings: Epidemiological Studies in Community and Institutional Settings; Bacterial and Viral Diseases; Immunoprophylaxis and Therapy; and Congenital Anomalies and Defects.

Many of the studies were based on data from the New York City Department of Health, and the large population in the study allowed firm conclusions to be drawn. There is a place for this book in the library of all units teaching epidemiology. The articles on influenza, poliomyelitis, rubella in pregnancy, and poliomyelitis and smallpox vaccination in pregnancy could be read with profit by all students of the subject. Some articles are perhaps only of historical value, but students who wish to extend their studies will find the list of references which follow most of the papers valuable.
