## Compendium on Poisoning

**Poisoning. Diagnosis and Treatment.** 1st American edition. By Sven Moeschlin, M.D. (Pp. 707+xviii; illustrated. \$29.75.) New York and London: Grune & Stratton. 1965.

It is probably a truism that clinical toxicology, unlike Gaul but certainly like the rest of clinical medicine, is divided into two parts—diagnosis and treatment. The latter, with occasional exceptions, resolves itself into the application of the general principles for dealing with medical emergencies. Proper diagnosis, on the other hand, is a much wider exercise. According to present-day, materialistic concepts the world around us

and within us is composed of a host of chemicals, and a glance any day at *Chemical Abstracts* affords ample testimony to the effect that people in laboratories are busy synthesizing even more. The problem then presents itself to the clinician—which of these are harmful to man, and how and by what means do they bring about their effects?

Nobody knows all the answers. What is more, the subject in itself is liable to division according to whether the compounds concerned present themselves as drugs, when therapeutics are involved; or make their impact in industry, when they come within the realm of occupational medicine; or appear in the environment, when they are a feature of public health—and so on. Thus what the everyday physician needs in order to become even partially knowledgeable about the diverse questions that may beset him from time to time is a compendious yet convenient book of reference. Professor Moeschlin has gone a long way in this work to providing the answer. He has covered an enormous territory, much of it from first-hand knowledge, and when he has turned to others he

has readily quoted the sources. Any clinician likely to be confronted with toxicological problems may well find this text of considerable assistance and support.

If there is any criticism to be made it is more of form than of content. To begin with, the translation of a medical text always presents difficulties, and in this instance a nagging awkwardness in the change from the original German to the English of the present edition unfortunately obtrudes. Next, a certain amount of condensation and systematic rearrangement might help to render the contents into a more succinct form. Finally, we would warn Professor Moeschlin, as he well knows, that his task is by no means complete. The index which he has compiled for us in permanent form as a book is in constant need of expansion. Successive editions will be needed every three or four years. Personally, I have a weakness for well-made and well-bound books like this one, but are they really justified when revisions (and thus repurchases) at such short intervals are going to be the rule?
