## Cleft Palate and Speech

Cleft Palate and Speech. 6th edition. By Muriel E. Morley, D.Sc., F.C.S.T., F.A.C.S.T. (Pp. 285+xx; illustrated. 30s.) Edinburgh and London: E. & S. Livingstone. 1966.

Four years have passed since the appearance of the preceding edition of this book, whose excellence has established it as a classic in this very specialized field. Once again Miss Morley's mastery of the subject is revealed by the detailed information and the comprehensive therapeutic instruction the new edition contains. It will be welcomed by speech therapists, junior and senior, all of whom will find something to learn from its pages.

The genuine understanding of the emotional as well as the physical problems of all ages is repeatedly demonstrated, and influences the recommendations regarding both timing and method of treatment.

Perhaps the analysis of speech development in the normal and the cleft child is the highlight of scientific accomplishment and clinical observation, giving the reader—surgeon, orthodontist, and speech therapist alike—the essential basic knowledge without which none of them can make maximum contributions towards giving a cleft child normal speech. This is the main purpose and value of Miss Morley's book, and for this reason perhaps future editions may see further modifications of the earlier chapters dealing with heredity,

classifications, and surgery. A case could be made for shortening all three without depriving the non-surgical reader of basic knowledge and interest. For example, the substitution of the story of the development of cleft palate surgery, which necessarily contains much which is nowadays never used, by a concise account of modern surgical and orthodontic principles and their application would be more useful and save space.

This suggestion, however, does not detract in any way from the value of the book to all who struggle to achieve normal speech for cleft-palate sufferers. They will find it invaluable.
