ledge unless the facts are sharply definable, stable, and consistent from case to case. Bone by its very character causes real technical difficulty in providing the microscopist with facts of the necessary precision. That advances are being made is shown by the illustrations in this book with their fine quality and convincingness. This is not a microscopist's book only; pathology is here the study of disease. The histopathological changes, gross and microscopic, are recognized as but instants in the course of processes; based on these facts and using modern chemical knowledge with proper scepticism, the author had sought out chains of causation with meticulous pertinacity and satisfying logic. Equally of note in these days is the steady distinguishing of hypothesis from fact, and for this reason itself the book is highly commended to the young doctor. For the older reader there is an unobtrusive recall of established facts and a gracious introduction to important new knowledge.

It is a real loss that the notes made by Collins on the neoplasms and dysplasias had not reached a final script, and so were omitted from this volume. But even as it stands this is a book that fills a need and does it well, not only for surgeons and pathologists but also for physicians, be they paediatric, geriatric,

or just middle-of-the-road, and chemists, be they clinical or just biological. Here we have tough stuff critically separated, confused darkness illuminated, and the whole made pleasurably readable.

Studies on Salmonella

The Bacteriology of Enterobacteriaceae. Collected Studies of the Author and his Co-Workers. By F. Kauffmann, M.D. (Pp. 400. 84 Dan.kr.) Copenhagen: Munksgaard. 1966.

Professor Kauffmann is accepted throughout the world as an authority on the classification and serological identification of members of the Salmonella and Escherichia coli groups. He has also a considerable knowledge and experience of other groups (genera) in the family. He states in the preface, "This book contains the collected studies of the author and his co-workers," which explains the unbalanced nature of the information on one genus as compared with another to the virtual exclusion of some, also the reference list, of which 20 pages are devoted to Kauffmann and his colleagues and two to other workers.

The list even omits the name of Bruce White, who published the fundamental work on which much of Kauffmann's later findings were based.

The first chapter is devoted to the author's views on definition, classification, and nomenclature, views which have not been accepted on an international basis and which the reviewer found almost incomprehensible when applied to the family as a whole. The most important chapter is that dealing with Salmonella, to which subject the author has made many fundamental additions. The interpretation of serological results denoting somatic and flagella variation of a degenerative nature are brought up to date. The modern classification of citrobacter has been used, but the author's views on the classification of Proteus is not generally accepted.

In spite of the lack of balance this book is essential for a laboratory interested in the classification of Enterobacteriaceae but should be used in conjunction with the previous book by the same author, Enterobacteriaceae. It is a pity that a chapter reviewing modern knowledge on the chemical nature of the antigens of enterobacteria was not included, as the author has made notable contributions in this field.
