present book, specifically designed for the undergraduate, would fill a real need in dental literature.

## Housebound Mothers

The Captive Wife. Conflicts of Housebound Mothers. By Hannah Gavron. (Pp. 176 + xiv. 25s.) London: Routledge & Kegan Paul. 1966.

One of the most significant victories that have been won by women in the battle for their rights has been the right to be treated like men. Significant but unsatisfactory. Girls are now educated in the same way as boys and for the same sort of careers. The labour market, organized by men, employs women and men on the same terms and demands the same continuity and hours of work (although often giving different pay). The fact that most women marry and have children and that almost all of them want to look after their children, and the fact that in recent times this has taken up only about ten years of their lives and that most women then still have half their lives ahead of them, have been ignored. So, too, have many other social and economic changes that affect modern families. Not surprisingly, therefore, young women are often quite unprepared for the vast changes in their lives that accompany the arrival of children.

Hannah Gavron's book, based on interviews of 98 mothers of young children, half working-class and half middle-class, shows just how much all these changes impinge on the mothers of young children. Almost all of the mothers worked outside their home before marriage and until the first child was

born. Then nearly all stopped work, and only one-third started again while their children were still young. Many of the middle-class mothers managed to keep some contacts with friends; working-class mothers' lives were much more restricted by young children, but a feeling of unpreparedness, of boredom and isolation, affected both groups. Most middleclass mothers saw the children as interrupting, but not terminating, a life with a skilled job outside their home. The working-class women mainly returned to work for the money and to escape their social isolation. Mrs. Gavron insists that educationists and employers must eventually accept the real differences in the lives of women and men and that society must find ways of helping mothers of young children to remain integrated with the rest of the community. This would be a victory indeed.
