Protein Sequence Determination: A Sourcebook of Methods and Techniques. Ed. Saul B. Needleman. (Pp. 345; £9.75) Chapman & Hall, 1970.

Since the pioneering work of Sanger on the structure of insulin, investigation of the amino-acid sequences of proteins has become an ever more popular pursuit for biochemists and molecular biologists. The techniques available for such studies are constantly being refined and extended and to those not familiar with the field may seem rather forbidding. This book provides a useful guide to these techniques for the beginner in pro-

for more experienced workers.

The book consists of a series of specialist chapters written by experts in the field. The emphasis is on practical aspects, and in most cases there is sufficient detail to enable the reader to use a technique without reference to the original source. The account of the automatic protein sequenator by P. Edman is particularly welcome and includes much work previously unpublished. Almost inevitably, individual authors emphasize some aspects of their subjects and rather neglect others; this is no disadvantage for those already familiar with the field, but may give the beginner a rather unbalanced view.

The overall approach of the book is fairly

tcin chemistry, as well as a reference book conventional, and partly because of this there are several quite serious omissions. Thus, determination of active centre sequences of enzymes and chemical modification techniques are not mentioned, and the use of paper electrophoresis and chromatography for peptide separations (including peptide map-ping and "diagonal" techniques) receives very brief consideration. These are often the very techniques most needed by workers with no previous knowledge of sequence studies. Despite these omissions, this book will be of great value to both beginners and experts in the field of protein chemistry. It is another useful volume in what is proving to be a most successful series on molecular biology.

Primer of Endocrinology

Essentials of Clinical Endocrinology. Norman G. Schneeberg, M.D. (Pp. 449; £10.10) Henry Kimpton, 1970.

The distinction between a book which is deliberately authoritative and one which is frankly didactic is a fine one, depending perhaps on the length of the text. This book is not short, but is written in a terse, factual style reminiscent of a student's primer. As such, its appeal to the practising physician may be limited, since in its aim to cover all aspects of clinical endocrinology discussion on controversial points is often limited.

On the credit side, the book is carefully set out, is easy to read, and has an excellent index. Each section deals with the physiology and chemistry of an endocrine gland followed by clinical descriptions. Laboratory investigations of the different disease syndromes are clearly explained, with detailed accounts of methods used and underlying theory. More emphasis is placed on diagnosis than on therapy. The sections on the disorders of the pituitary gland and on diabetes mellitus are especially good, but in a 36-page section on calcium metabolism I was slightly surprised to find only a cursory mention of thyrocalcitonin. A chapter on cytogenetics in

endocrinology is clear and relevant. The quality of the diagrams and illustrations is very high, and the text is thankfully free from eponyms.

The non-endocrinologist will be con-fronted by a large number of facts if he dips into this book; for a reference text, however, he may prefer a more considered appraisal of clinical endocrinology. If the medical student can afford to buy it he will become greatly informed although he may feel that the title-Essentials of Clinical Endocrinology-is slightly misleading.

Tackling Alcoholism

The Treatment of Alcoholics: An Evaluative Study. Sidney Cahn. (Pp. 246; £3.75) Oxford University Press. 1970.

The Department of Health has recently given the cheering news that more money is to be made available for alcoholism treatment services. Those who have for long argued that alcoholism is a sadly neglected problem have much cause to rejoice-would that Dr. Lincoln Williams had lived to see the day. But as the sounds of grateful jubilation die away on the breeze, a rather embarrassing question makes itself heard. Has anyone even the hint of an informed notion as to how such new money should most effectively be spent?

With astonishing timeliness, there arrives from across the Atlantic a book which looks

The desirability and importance of physical fitness is accepted by the medical profession among others, and how to achieve this through a controlled programme of exercise starting at school age is described in Mr. Harcourt Roy's book. The author was

at America's alcoholism treatment services. The writing is based on four years of field research in which Mr. Cahn jogged around the U.S.A., visited 300 treatment centres, and talked to more than 700 people who in many different capacities were concerned with the care of alcoholics. The fruits of such an experience could, of course, have been no more than a well-documented confusion. In the event, what Mr. Cahn has produced is a detailed analysis of a problem, a clear statement of possible alternative solutions to that problem, and a reasoned choice of solution from among those listed alternatives.

In health planning the American experience is sometimes only dubiously relevant to Britain. In this instance, the relevance of the American review to our response to the Secretary's largesse cannot be doubted. The relevance is not, however, a matter of un-

critical point-by-point transference of American answers to the British scene, but of Cahn's having identified large and central questions which are closely similar on either side of the Atlantic. The most fundamental planning question of all is whether alcoholism services are to be expanded as a specialty or whether, on the contrary, the expansion should be encouraged to take place as integrated within general health and welfare systems. The latter choice is the one which Cahn would favour. But whether the problem is specialism versus generalism, skid row solutions within or without mainstream responses, planning versus bold leaps in the dark, the relationship between voluntary and statutory effort, the problems of liaison between care and after-care-on all these and other questions, this book offers sagacious argument.
