comer to clinical research. A large part of the text is devoted to the problems of organizing follow-up studies, both retrospective and prospective, on which our knowledge of long-term prognosis must necessarily be based. The advice is full of common sense and any novice who followed their general directions would be greatly helped. The topics covered include the collection and recording of clinical data, the organization of a follow-up clinic for prospective studies, and methods of treating data. Also there is an excellent chapter on

the presentation of results.

It seems to me that clinical research embraces much more than is even mentioned in this book, as it obviously includes, among other things, short-term physiological, pharmacological, and biochemical studies on human beings with any kind of disease. Furthermore, controlled therapeutic trials of drugs are not covered in any detail. However, the fact that the authors have restricted themselves to a somewhat confined view of clinical research has probably helped them to write briefly and with vigour on

the important aspects of clinical research which they know well.

There are plenty of books dealing with statistical methods, computer analysis, and life-tables, but most of these fail to tell the novice clinical research worker how to set about his first study. The ordinary physician or surgeon who is busily engaged in clinical work and who wants to organize some of his clinical experience in order to advance knowledge is likely to get much more help from the slim volume now being reviewed.

# Clinical Care of Patients

The Metabolic Basis of Surgical Care. William F. Walker, F.R.C.S., and Ivan D. A. Johnston, F.R.C.S. (Pp. 251; £3.) Heinemann. 1971.

"The purpose of this book is to give a concise account of the composition and metabolism of the body in health and disease. . . . This book is offered to clinicians who have day to day care of patients in hospital . . . to students preparing for their final examination . . . to junior hospital doctors who face the primary examination in basic medical sciences."

These statements are from the preface, so this book must be judged on its success in explaining a fairly complex subject to non-specialist readers. Generally speaking it succeeds, and readers will repeatedly find it of value for reference in difficult situations.

The early chapters are on the composition of the body, water and electrolyte metabolism and their disorders, nutrition, and the metabolic response to injury. Chapters on the vital and practical subjects of circulatory homeostasis and hydrogen ion regulation follow, and these offer a good sample of the authors' approach. A large amount of information is clearly set out and if carefully read these chapters are very useful. The chapter on hydrogen ion regulation is made significantly harder to read by the way in which the subsection headings have been worked out, and the printer could have helped by deploying a wider range of type faces. This criticism applies elsewhere. However, I found the effort required was rewarded by a very good exposition.

Some tightening up of the advice given is needed. At one place we are advised to treat haemorrhagic shock initially with plasma expander or group O blood, while five pages later we are advised to give Hartmann's solution until blood is crossmatched. Is it wise to suggest that blood

volume studies with radioactive albumin should be taking place in the urgent shock situation when considerable doubt has already been cast on their value a few pages back? It seems a pity to classify degrees of shock in Table 25 by systolic blood pressure levels when the limitations of blood pressure in assessing the severity of shock have, very properly, been pointed out.

Intravenous feeding is a topic which will interest many surgeons and this book gives a helpful and clear account. More specific practical advice on the design of the diet would be useful. The technique section might usefully devote space to the safer method using peripheral veins with a Y-connexion to allow simultaneous infusion of two solutions.

In all, the writing is clear and concentrated, and a considerable area of the subject covered in some 250 pages. Numerous well-chosen references are quoted.

# 65 Years—the Watershed

Retirement in American Society. Impact and Process. Gordon F. Streib, and Clement J. Schneider, S.J. (Pp. 316; £5.) Cornell University Press. 1972.

This is a report on the Cornell study of occupational retirement in which a fairly representative, predominantly white, urban population of regularly employed persons were examined with a questionnaire method before and after they had reached retirement age. Those who did not retire during the seven-year period of observation, in which they were contacted once a year, were used as a control group. The authors, who are sociologists, aimed at determining the effects of retirement on the individual's self-evaluation of his health, on his objective and subjective economic condition, his satisfaction in life, and his feeling of usefulness.

Of the original research population of 3,793 70% answered the first questionnaire and 1,969 participated to the end of the study, an unusually high proportion in this kind of follow-up. Most of the drop-outs belonged to the lower income groups and a relatively high proportion of them were foreign-born. One hundred participants were interviewed personally.

Decline in physical and mental health was not more marked among the "retirees" than among those who continued working. The former only rarely felt deprived economically, although their incomes dropped by more than half on the average. Less than a quarter of them expressed a feeling of uselessness. Attitudes before retirement were found to be more influencial in determining satisfaction or dissatisfaction with it than was retirement itself. Its future adverse effects tended to be overestimated.

Much has been made of loss of roles as the result of retirement, but, as the role expectations of the old are limited, loss of roles is acceptable to most of them.

This interesting longitudinal study leaves only one lingering doubt. Are the respondents who participated to the end representative of the study population, or does the rosy picture of old age and retirement fit only those who are in the habit of answering questionnaires? The authors were aware of this problem and compared available particulars of the drop-outs with those of the participants. They found that the former, when first contacted, were more pessimistic about retirement and had lower self-evaluation of their health than the latter. Future investigations of this type will have to find ways and means of keeping the loss of study population to a minimum.
