A new hospital, the Wellington, has been built in London by a subsidiary of the British and Commonwealth Shipping Group for the treatment of patients in the private sector. The air-conditioned building is in St. John's Wood, not far from Lords cricket



ground. There are 98 bedrooms for inpatients, each with a private bathroom, and the hospital also provides suites for outpatient consultation. There are three operating theatres and a full range of diagnostic services is provided including facilities for xray and biochemical investigation. Patients will be admitted under the care of any doctor approved by the hospital, and there will be two medical residents to provide roundthe-clock cover.

The purpose of the study, under its director Eric Reid, Ph.D., is to try to develop high pressure liquid chromatography as an accurate technique of measuring adrenaline and noradrenaline levels in the urine, which at present is a long and complex process.

Some Research Grants for Glasgow
