Annual Postgraduate Meeting: Isle of Man

The B.M.A.'s Third Annual Postgraduate Meeting will be held in Douglas, Isle of Man, between 19 and 22 September. As the provisional programme (Supplement, p. 77) shows, it comprises a variety of practical clinical topics for discussion, interspersed with clinical demonstrations at Ramsey Group Practice and Noble's Hospital. The local organizers have arranged a full social programme for the delegates after the clinical sessions, including a ride on the narrow gauge Victorian steam railway. An attraction to those contemplating going to the meeting is the fully inclusive conference "package." This covers return air travel from most United Kingdom airports to Douglas, coach transport from airport to hotel, and four days' accommodation with full board, including the conference dinner.

Discriminatory Advertisements Banned

The Federal Council of the Medical Association of South Africa has decided that the South African Medical Journal should ban advertisements offering non-white doctors lower pay than whites. This move follows many protests, without effect, to the South African Government from the Medical Association about discrimination against non-white doctors in posts financed by the Government.
