The Committee, which first met on 22 May, has the following terms of reference: "To consider the terms upon which senior medical and dental staff are employed in the National Health Service in Great Britain, including systems of remuneration (but not those matters which are within the remit of the Review Body on Doctors' and Dentists' Remuneration) and arrangements for private practice, and to report."

Battered Children

The Department of Health and Social Security has issued a new memorandum on non-accidental injury to children. In it, the importance of early recognition is emphasized, and the point is made that the first signs of trouble may be very minor injuries, such as bruises or small burns.

In the event of reasonable suspicion the memorandum states that a child should be admitted to hospital at once. Further advice on management and rehabilitation is given, and a recommendation is made that area review committees be set up to co-ordinate action over all local cases of child battering. In particular they will make sure that workers involved do not lose touch with families if they move to another area. The review committees are being asked to submit reports on what is being done in their areas to the Secretary of State for Social Services, Mrs. Barbara Castle, by the end of 1974. More Support for Nurses

The Central Committee for Hospital Medical Services of the British Medical Association passed the following resolution unanimously at its meeting on 23 May:

"That the C.C.H.M.S. strongly supports the objectives of the nurses in their endeavours to improve not only their pay but status and conditions of work."

V.A.T. Relief on Aids for Disabled

The Value Added Tax (Aids for Disabled) Order 1974 comes into operation on 1 June. Its purpose is to zero-rate certain aids and appliances when supplied direct to chronically sick and disabled persons for their own domestic use. Previously these goods could be supplied free of V.A.T. only through the N.H.S. or through the personal social service departments of local authorities or, for many minor appliances as well as all drugs and medicines, when dispensed by a chemist on a doctor's prescription. Patients will still be able to obtain goods in these ways and hospitals, registered nursing homes, institutions, and local authorities will continue to receive supplies tax paid.

The relief is limited in all cases to supplies made to chronically sick or disabled persons for their domestic use. Further information about the changes may be obtained from any Customs and Excise V.A.T. office and copies of the Order will be available from H.M.S.O. or through booksellers.
