of the most satisfactory proportion found naturally in drinking water, namely, in temperate climates, one part of fluoride per million parts of water. Extensive studies here and abroad have shown that this proportion of fluoride in drinking water, combined with the intake from the diet, is not associated with any harmful effect in children or adults.'

Medical reports

Asked about the current guidelines to hospitals on the disclosure of medical reports on patients to individuals and organisations other than medical advisers, Mr Roland Moyle said in a written answer on 1 November, "Guidance to health authorities on disclosure of information about hospital patients engaged in legal proceedings is contained in memorandum HM(59)88 as modified by circular letters DS211/73 and DS179/74. . . . There is no departmental guidance on disclosure of medical reports in other circumstances. Such disclosure is a matter for the doctor concerned, subject as may be appropriate to the consent of the patient."

Medical records

In a written question on 1 November the Minister of State was asked why patients who had been treated either by NHS general practitioners or in hospital were not allowed to see, or have copies of, their personal medical records. Mr Roland Moyle replied, "Medical records are compiled by doctors to assist them in the management and treatment of a case. It is a matter of clinical judgment for the doctor concerned to disclose to his patient such information as he considers necessary and advisable in the circumstances. Although he will wish to keep his patient properly informed, there are many occasions when it would not be in the interest of the medical well-being of a patient to disclose information contained in his medical records."

Marburg-type virus

The infectious disease which has caused many deaths recently in the Southern Sudan and Zaire is now known to be caused not by Marburg virus but by a virus with slightly different properties. The infecting virus differs from true Marburg virus antigenically. It is either a variant of Marburg virus or an entirely new one.

A male technician at the Microbiological Establishment at Porton who had been working with the virus was admitted to hospital last week for observation. He has a remittent fever and slight diarrhoea of undetermined aetiology.
