New professor of chemical pathology at Southampton

Professor Barbara E Clayton, professor of chemical pathology at the Institute of Child Health, University of London, has been appointed to the chair of chemical pathology and human metabolism at Southampton, to succeed Professor George Alberti on 1 January 1979. Professor Clayton, who will be the university's first woman professor, is a graduate of the University of Edinburgh and holds the degrees of PhD and MD; she is also a fellow of the Royal College of Pathologists and of the Royal College of Physicians. She was Holden research fellow at St Thomas's Hospital Medical School from 1949 to 1956, when she was appointed lecturer in chemical pathology there. In 1959 she became consultant in charge of chemical pathology at the Hospital for Sick Children, London, and has been a recognised teacher in chemical pathology in the University of London since 1960. Professor Clayton took up her present post in 1970.

New professors at Newcastle upon Tyne

Dr D Roberts has been appointed to a personal chair of human genetics from 1 August. Dr Roberts, who is 53, after his war service took a degree in geography at Cambridge in 1948. In 1949 he was awarded the university's diploma in physical anthropology with distinction, and for the next nine years was demonstrator in physical anthropology at Oxford, proceeding to the degree of DPhil in 1953. After field researches in West Africa he was visiting professor in the University of Michigan in 1960-1, after which he became Curl lecturer to the Royal Anthropological Institute and in 1963 professor of physical anthropology in the University of Washington, Seattle. After a period with the Medical Research Council Population Genetics Unit, he was appointed lecturer in human genetics at Oxford in 1966 and the next year reader. Dr Roberts has organised a genetic advisory service for the Oxford Region, and his recent research interests have been in developing population genetic methods and elucidating the genetic components of certain pathological states. He was awarded an ScD by the University of Cambridge in 1975.

Dr William Walker, who is 59, graduated MB from Durham University in 1942, proceeding MD in 1950. After his war service

and a year as deputy director of the National Blood Transfusion Service, in 1948 he was appointed to a Luccock research fellowship in the department of child health at Durham, where he became a lecturer in 1952, a senior lecturer in paediatric haematology in 1965, and reader in child health in 1966. In 1972 he was appointed consultant physician and reader in haematology. He was elected FRCPath in 1968 and FRCP in 1972. Dr Walker's special interests have included haemolytic diseases of the newborn and exchange transfusion.

Instructions to authors

The following are the minimum requirements for manuscripts submitted for publication.

(1) **Typing** should be on one side of the paper, with double or triple spacing between the lines and 5-cm margins at the top and left-hand side of the sheet.

(2) **Two copies** (or preferably three) should be submitted.

(3) **Spelling** should conform to that of *Chambers Twentieth Century Dictionary*.

(4) **References** must be set out in the style used in the *BMJ*, and their accuracy verified before the manuscript is submitted.

(5) **SI units** are used for scientific measurements. In the text they should be followed by traditional units in parentheses. In tables and illustrations values are given only in SI units, but a conversion factor must be supplied. For general guidance on the International System of Units, and some useful conversion factors, see *The SI for the Health Professions* (WHO, 1977).

(6) **Authors** should give their names and initials, their current appointments, and not more than two degrees or diplomas. Each author must sign the covering letter as evidence of consent to publication.

(7) **Acknowledgments** will not be sent unless a stamped addressed envelope or an international reply coupon is enclosed.

(8) **Detailed instructions** are given in the *BMJ* dated 7 January (p 6).
