New professor of neurosurgery at Birmingham

Mr E R Hitchcock has been appointed professor of neurosurgery at the University of Birmingham in succession to Professor E Brodie Hughes. Professor Hitchcock, who is 49, graduated in medicine from Birmingham in 1952 and then held various posts at the university, followed by two years at University College Hospital, London. From 1960 he specialised in neurology, first holding a Medical Research Council research fellowship and subsequently appointments at the Radcliffe Infirmary and the Universities of Oxford and Manchester. In 1966 he moved to Edinburgh, where he has been reader in surgical neurology and consultant neurosurgeon. Professor Hitchcock's research and publications have been on epilepsy, behavioural disorders, trauma, intractable pain, and stereotactic operations. He has developed new methods of analgesic surgery, and has established a brain research laboratory and a pain-relieving clinic in Edinburgh.

New professors at the Queen's University of Belfast

Dr T J Harrison, reader and consultant in anatomy at the Queen's University of Belfast, has been appointed to the chair of anatomy in the university. Dr Harrison, who is 59, graduated in medicine from the university in 1942 and after serving in the medical branch of the RAF he held various lecturing posts in anatomy in Belfast. His research has been mainly on problems of skeletal growth.

Dr W F M Wallace, senior lecturer and consultant in physiology at the university, has been appointed to the chair of applied physiology. Dr Wallace, who is 42, graduated in medicine from the university in 1961, and has held various teaching appointments in the departments of therapeutics and pharmacology and of physiology. His research interests are in pure and applied physiology and medical education.

Withdrawal of amphetamine

Smith Kline and French have ceased manufacture of most of their products containing amphetamine (Drinamyl, Steladex, and Dexedrine spansules). Dexamphetamine tablets will still be available for the treatment of narcolepsy.

Counselling before and after bereavement

Cruse, the National Organisation for Widows and their Children, is holding its sixth course of seminars and discussion groups on counselling before and after bereavement from 11 January to 15 March. The course, at the Royal Free Hospital, London NW3, is open to doctors, social workers, ministers of religion, nurses, health visitors, educationalists, and all who work in a professional capacity with dying and bereaved people. Instructions to authors

The following are the minimum requirements for manuscripts submitted for publication.

- (1) Typing should be on one side of the paper, with double or triple spacing between the lines and 5-cm margins at the top and left-hand side of the sheet.
- (2) Two copies (or preferably three) should be submitted.
- (3) Spelling should conform to that of Chambers Twentieth Century Dictionary,
- (4) References must be set out in the style used in the BMJ, and their accuracy verified before the manuscript is submitted.
- (5) SI units are used for scientific measurements. In the text they should be followed by traditional units in parentheses. In tables and illustrations values are given only in SI units, but a conversion factor must be supplied. For general guidance on the International System of Units, and some useful conversion factors, see The SI for the Health Professions (WHO, 1977).
- (6) Authors should give their names and initials, their current appointments, and not more than two degrees or diplomas. Each author must sign the covering letter as evidence of consent to publication.
- (7) Acknowledgments will not be sent unless a stamped addressed envelope or an international reply coupon is enclosed.
- (8) Detailed instructions are given in the BM7 dated 7 January (p 6).
