The Scientific Basis of Medicine Annual Reviews, 1969. British Postgraduate Medical Federation. (Pp. 348+ix; illustrated. 50s.) London: Athlone Press. 1969.

The late Lord Florey, in the opening lecture of this the seventeenth volume of an annual series, says that one of the pressing problems of medical education is the proper assimilation of what is important in new advances. At the risk of being thought complacent my answer would be that so long as lectures such as these continue to be given, and published, he need have no fears. For not only do they illuminate the science of medicine, now generally regarded as of overriding importance by our teachers, but they also enhance rather

than threaten (as some believe) established attitudes towards medicine as an art.

Many examples could be quoted from this collection, but I will limit myself to David Price Evans's well-known studies of drug polymorphism from which he concludes that "we shall have to think of treating our patients on a much more personal basis . . . than we have done in the past." My reservations, if any, about all this new knowledge are slightly different and perhaps more selfish; they concern the premium on time and the limits of individual comprehension. I can only hope that tomorrow's graduates will be able to appreciate, for instance, the niceties of hormonal regulation of protein synthesis (J. R. Tata), or the biochemistry of the myelin sheath (A. N. Davison), with-

out being more immediately attracted, as I was, to topics like the retinal circulation (C. T. Dollery), Hodgkin's disease (D. W. Smithers), or kinins (V. Eisen).

These are only a handful out of the 19 lectures spanning many aspects of clinical and experimental medicine. All I can usefully do is to urge readers to get hold of the book, and to look specially at the cumulative index of lecturers and titles for the past 17 years. A repository of the scientific advances of the last 50 years is embodied in over 300 papers. Perhaps the authorities might be persuaded to publish this index separately, for it would surely provide a magnificent reference source for the modern physician.
