whose admission is deferred at the patient's New Permanent Secretary at D.H.S.S. own wish-should be kept separate from the waiting list.

REPORTS

Regional health authorities have been asked to collate the reports together with their own observations for submission to the D.H.S.S. As well as statistical information (at 30 September 1975 and 31 March 1976) the Department wants a brief description of the present system used for waiting list admissions and details of any changes made following the review. The following figures are required for each specialty: total number of patients on waiting list, number of patients on waiting list classified as urgent, number of the latter who have been waiting for more than one month, number of patients not classified as urgent, and the number of these who have been waiting for more than one year. The Department wants authorities to state their proposals for further action if insufficient progress has been made.

The Secretary of State has decided that £5m. of the total sum available to authorities for minor capital works should be devoted to reducing long waiting lists in 1975-6. A follow-through programme will be undertaken in 1976-7 when the management review and statistical data should have provided evidence on which to base such a programme.

M.R.C. Travelling Fellowships 1976-7

Registrar Training Scheme

The D.H.S.S. has agreed with officers of the Royal College of Radiologists to continue the supernumerary registrar training scheme for those trainees who start their training in or before October 1975. The post must be filled and the application for funding received by the D.H.S.S. not later than 28 November. As a matter of policy the D.H.S.S. intends to discontinue the scheme and is recommending that, in order to maintain the number of people in training, the registrar establishment should be expanded by a number equal to the existing number of supernumerary posts.

Sir Patrick Nairne will succeed Sir Philip Rogers as permanent secretary to the D.H.S.S. in October. Sir Patrick, who is 53, has been second permanent secretary in the Cabinet Office since 1973. He entered the



Civil Service in 1947 and has held posts in the Admiralty and the Ministry of Defence.

Report on Drugs

The Committee on Safety of Medicines has been undertaking a retrospective inquiry into the drugs taken by mothers who have given birth to babies with a congenital abnormality. The committee's latest annual report (for 1974) says that the investigation is based on a sample of birth defects notified to the Office of Population Censuses and Surveys. The committee also comments on alcohol in medicinal products. It states that when ethyl alcohol or other excipients are present in sufficient quantity to be pharmacologically active they should be listed on the packaging as active ingredients.

By the end of 1974 the committee had received 187 reports of adverse effects on the eye in patients treated with practolol. There were also several hundred reports of skin reactions and 25 of deafness; 14 patients had developed a syndrome resembling systemic lupus erythematosus and eight an unusual form of sclerosing peritonitis. It therefore sent out a leaflet in its "Adverse Reactions" series in January this year, and in its annual report it expresses the hope that doctors will continue to report adverse reactions with this or any other betablocking agent.
