Hazards from Noise

The World Health Organization has published another pamphlet in its series "In Point of Fact" on *Ear Pollution*. This sets out 25 facts about noise, giving advice and information on how excess noise can affect physical and psychological health and pointing out that occupational deafness is a growing health hazard. The pamphlet is obtainable from the World Health Organization in Geneva.

Diseases from Fish

A comprehensive account of *Fish and Shellfish Hygiene* has been published by W.H.O. (Technical Report Series no. 550, price Sw.fr. 6). An expert committee met last year to consider the problem and the report includes a detailed account of the principal human diseases associated with fish and shellfish and the public health problems created by the production, processing, and distribution of fish and fish products. Recommendations are given for the epidemiological investigation of outbreaks of food poisoning thought to be due to fish and shellfish, and there are also recommendations on aspects of the subject which seem to justify further research.
