Georg Mandahl-Barth, D.Phil., director of the Danish Bilharziasis Laboratory, has been awarded the Novo Foundation prize for 1975 of D. Kr. 50,000 (approx. £4000) "for his contribution towards fighting one of the major diseases infecting the people of tropical and subtropical Africa-schistosomiasis.
