# **Professor of Child Psychiatry, London**

Dr. Philip J. Graham has been appointed to the Walker chair of child psychiatry at the Institute of Child Health, London. Dr.



Graham, who is 42, received his undergraduate medical education at Cambridge University and at University Col-Hospital, lege London. He graduated in 1959. After house appointments he received postgraduate medical training and research experience

at Maudsley Hospital and the Institute of Psychiatry. He was appointed to the consultant staff there, and also Medical Director of Brixton Child Guidance Clinic in 1966. Since 1968 he has been full-time head of the department of psychological medicine at the Hospital for Sick Children, Great Ormond Street, London. Dr. Graham's research interests and published work relate to the epidemiology of psychiatric disorder in childhood, psychotherapy and its evaluation, and psychiatric aspects of childhood neurological disorder. He is currently chairman of the child psychiatry section of the Royal College of Psychiatrists.

#### New Chair in Growth and Development, Manchester

Dr. John Dobbing, senior lecturer in the department of child health, University of Manchester, has been appointed to a new



research chair in growth and development within that department, endowed with a grant of £200,000 from the National Fund for Research into Crip-Diseases. pling Dr. Dobbing, who is 52, was educated at Bootham School, York, and at St. Mary's Hospital

Medical School, London, where he graduated in 1953. He was lecturer in pathology and Gull student at Guy's Hospital until 1961, when he became senior lecturer at the Institute of Child Health, London. His major research interest has been in quantitative aspects of the growth and development of the human brain and experimental studies in animals on its vulnerability to environmental adversity.

#### **Birmingham Medical Institute Centenary**

To celebrate the centenary of its foundation the Birmingham Medical Institute is to hold a day symposium on 5 February 1975 on the historical and educational aspects of the institute's work. A limited edition of a silver medal bearing the badge of the Institute on the obverse and a delineation of the facade of the original premises on the reverse is to be struck for the occasion by the Birmingham Mint. #### **Radioactive Fallout**

Concentrations in atmospheric dust and rain water of long-lived fusion products such as radioactive strontium and caesium were about three times higher in the first six months of 1974 than in the corresponding period of 1973. These figures are given in the latest account of Radioactive fallout in air and rain published by the United Kingdom Atomic Energy Authority. The report says the rise was due to the Chinese nuclear test of June 1973. Traces of short-lived activity from the Chinese test of June 1974 were detected a month later in Britain.

The world-wide deposits of radioactive strontium and caesium have remained more or less constant since 1966, with the total in the northern hemisphere about three times that in the southern.
