Census data on immigrants

Of the 48m inhabitants of England and Wales 2·6m were born outside the British Isles, and details of their social circumstances are given in *Census 1971 England and Wales Household Composition Tables Part II, 10% Sample*, published recently by HMSO, price £5·30. Most immigrants were from New Commonwealth countries, and nearly one-third of those from Pakistan and Africa reported no family; but those whose families were with them lived in crowded conditions—just over one person per room compared with the national average of 0·6 per room. In all, three-quarters of a million households were headed by immigrants; 15% were in shared dwellings, and 5% in dwellings without the exclusive use of a stove and sink—compared with only 1% for the country as a whole.
