### Fewer cigarettes

Cigarette consumption in the second quarter of 1975 was 12% lower than in the corresponding period of 1974, according to ASH (the Action on Smoking and Health campaign). The director of ASH claimed that the fall is the result of a combination of price increases and anti-smoking propaganda. Some of the fall in the weight of tobacco smoked can be attributed to changes in smoking patterns: filter cigarettes are gradually replacing plain ones and there is also a trend favouring the smaller brands.

### NHS to employ more disabled people

"Not enough disabled people are applying for jobs... for which they are clearly qualified." Mr Alfred Morris, Minister for the Disabled, was announcing in a lecture in London last week that he and his ministerial colleagues hoped to increase the number of registered disabled people employed in the NHS and the DHSS. All NHS employing authorities are to be asked to co-operate. He hoped that more people would respond to advertisements for posts in all central government departments.

Mr Morris drew his audience's attention to the new £5 a week mobility allowance for the severely disabled which will come into force in 1976. This will give mobility help to an extra 100 000 people who cannot or do not want to drive.
