Sterilisation of children

The Department of Health has issued a discussion paper (HSI/MED D1) on the sterilisation of children under 16 years of age. Comment on the paper is being sought from area health authorities, community health councils, women's and children's organisations, and professional bodies.

Suggestions made in the paper include the introduction of a statutory requirement that sterilisation should be approved by an independent local ethical committee; giving the Secretary of State power to appoint a committee for the same purpose; and proposals for a notification procedure, which might be simply administrative or a means of ensuring that any permissions thought necessary had in fact been obtained.

Childhood tuberculosis

The Medical Research Council's National Tuberculin Survey has shown that the numbers of schoolchildren infected with tuberculosis at the age of 13 are steadily declining—the proportion is halved about every five years. The Department of Health has accepted two recommendations from the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation: firstly, that BCG vaccination of schoolchildren should continue, and, secondly, that children born into Asian and African immigrant communities should be offered BCG vaccination at birth.

Tropical child health

Work has now begun on building Europe's first department of tropical paediatrics at the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine. It is to be called the Maegraith wing after Professor B G Maegraith, who retired at the end of September after 30 years as dean of the school. The cost is estimated at £630 000.

Training course in cancer research

The International Union Against Cancer is holding its third training course in cancer research at the Chester Beatty Institute in London from 5 to 18 September 1976. This course is intended for postgraduate students in biology or medicine, under the age of 30, who wish to specialise in cancer research. Students will be expected to meet their own expenses; there will be no entrance fee. Further details are available from Dr D M Taylor, Institute of Cancer Research, Sutton, Surrey SM2 5PX.
