THE NEW HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMPTION. The foundation stone of the City of London Hospital in the Victoria Park, was laid on Wednesday the 25th June, by His Royal Highness Prince Albert, under the most auspicious circumstances. After the ceremony, a large and distinguished company partook of a splendid déjeuner. The Earl of Carlisle, the Chevalier Bunsen, and the Bishop of Oxford, greatly enlivened the proceedings, by eloquent and interesting speeches. A blessing on the work was invoked by the Bishop of London. On the 11th of June, 1844, His Royal Highness Prince Albert laid the foundation stone of the sister institution at Brompton.

Brompton Hospital for Consumption and Diseases of the Chest. The authorities of this Institution are at present actively engaged in collecting contributions, for the purpose of completing this edifice. A grand military concert and fancy fair, held on the 18th and 19th June, in the gardens of the Royal Hospital, Chelsea, have, after paying all expenses, cleared we believe, about £1,000. It is proposed to have, this season, another fête, with the view of raising a further sum of money for the building fund.
