## PARAGRAPHS FROM OUR PORTFOLIO.

XXXI. THE CORONER'S COURT IN DERBYSHIRE. We ask our readers to peruse with attention a letter at p. 541, from Dr. WEBB, of Wirksworth, upon the Coroner's Court in Derbyshire. The disclosures therein contained are absolutely astounding, yet they are authenticated in such a way as to prevent the possibility of their being impugned. We ask Dr. Webb and other associates in Derbyshire to come forward with additional information regarding the proceedings of Messrs. Mander at Bakewell, so that the magistrates of the county and Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department, may deal with them in accordance with the demands of outraged decency and justice.

The Coroner's Court is, in its present state, in most places, an useless complication of the criminal jurisprudence of England; and we could name other counties besides Derby in which the inquiries of the coroner are "mere shams"; and in very many cases which we could cite, they have been the means of defeating justice. The uses and abuses of the Coroner's Court form a subject of great magnitude and importance; and we intend on some future occasion to devote to its careful consideration a series of articles. In the mean time, we shall be glad to place on record, for future analysis, facts bearing upon the proposed inquiry.

XXXII. NAVAL MEDICAL REFORM ASSOCIATION. We trust that the Committee are securing the funds necessary to carry on the arduous and probably protracted contest upon which they have entered. Funds are the sinews of war.
