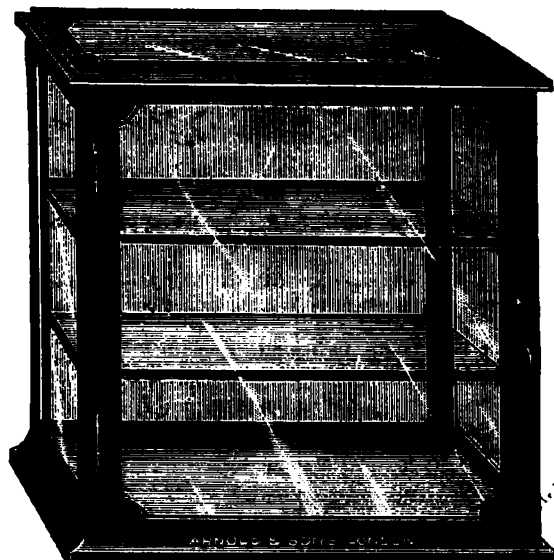

Extract from the "Lancet," April 2nd, 1898:— "The illustration shows a new form of weighing machine made by Messrs. Arnold & Sons, London. The machine is so constructed that by a simple arrangement of a regulating nut any person can adjust the balance to the greatest nicety. All machines are liable through wear or otherwise to get out of order, and this necessitates sending them to the maker for adjustment, but the manufacturers believe that much trouble and expense will be obviated by the simple nut arrangement introduced into the new machine. The machines can be supplied with or without the stand and measuring standard. They are simple in design, cheap, and reliable, and will consequently be found useful adjuncts to the consulting-room. They also have the advantage of occupying very little space, and so can be put away under a chair or cupboard when not required."

Extract from "British Medical Journal," April 23rd, 1898:— "This machine has been constructed with a view to economy both of space and first cost. As the height of the pillar measures 9 inches, it can be easily stowed away when not in use.
