"Nineteen of these pills were knocked into the board with a blow of the hammer and without crushing, or apparent damage. Surely no comment is needed on the solubility of a pill, whether coated or uncoated, which is sufficiently hard to penetrate a board."—*Journal of Medicine and Science*, September, 1897.

The Chemist and Druggist, of May 29th, 1897, says:—"Some coated pills were taken by a patient; after a few days eight of the pills reappeared, having passed through the body apparently unchanged. The pills were discontinued; but for days they continued to appear. This naturally annoyed the prescriber, and rendered the position of all concerned rather an ignominious one."

SPIRAL ELASTIC STOCKINGS.

There are few members of the profession who have not had experience of the extreme disappointment so often resulting from the use of elastic stockings by their patients.
