DAULAT KHAN, THE AFGHAN GOVERNOR OF THE PANJAB, SURRENDERING TO BABAR. Daulat Khan, who had first joined forces with Babar, subsequently led an insurrection against him. The old Afghan chief had girded on two swords, the symbol of his resolve to win or die. His army of 40,000 men, however, fled at Babar's approach. The scene here reproduced is thus described by Babar:—"Daulat Khan now sent a person to inform me that if I would excuse his offences he would come as a slave and deliver up the place. I therefore sent Khwajeh Mir Miran to confirm him in his resolution and to bring him out. In order to expose the rudeness and the stupidity of the old man, I directed him to take care that Daulat Khan should come out with the same two swords hung round his neck, which he had hung by his side to meet me in combat." Date, A.D. 1528.
