A great deal is heard just now of standardisation, but nutritional requirements of infants are not susceptible to such regimentation, and exceptions will be found to "prove" almost every rule.

either by persistent intramuscular injection; at daily or short intervals of 400 i.u., or by single or divided intravenous injection, at cyclic intervals, of 400 to 1000 i.u.



Such stimulation, though not always followed by overt cyclic hæmorrhages, should be adequate to direct the physical trend toward normality.
