The ease with which the instrument falls into two pieces is very remarkable, combined as it is with a perfect steadiness and celerity as the two blades move on one another in the act of cutting. This is secured by a spring which is part of an ingenious mechanism of the very simplest kind.

The advantages therefore are two. The instrument can be made absolutely clean with the very least amount of trouble, and the existence of a keen cutting edge is absolutely certain, because the blades in the act of cutting can hardly, except with a very prolonged effort, become mis-fitting, and in any case a very slight increase of the spring tension would make scissors as good as new. The very slightest touch of the nail along the flat edge removes the arras and gives a perfectly bright cutting edge instantly.
