**INDIAN BOWMAN.** The Mogul Indian bowmen were very expert with their weapons "a bowman shooting six times before a musketeer can fire twice." The bow was about 4 feet long and generally shaped in a double curve; it was of horn, wood, bamboo, ivory, and sometimes of steel. The strings were made of strong threads of white silk laid together to the thickness of a goose quill, then whipped with the same material for 3 or 4 inches at the centre. Sometimes strings of catgut were used, whipped with silk at the centre and ends. The gift of an arrow from the king's quiver as a security for peace was noted by early European visitors to India. On one occasion a sovereign released his enemy's minstrel, binding his own quiver round the man's loins. Every prisoner claimed by the minstrel as his relative received an arrow and was set free.
