



Reducing the chance of relapse in vaginal candidosis

When *Candida* plays hide and seek

Recent microscopy studies have shown that *Candida albicans* appears capable of penetrating the deeper keratinous layers of vaginal epithelial cells. This suggests that the organisms may be protected from topical antifungal agents, only to re-emerge and proliferate again some time later when the epithelial cells are normally shed.

As the deeper layers of the vaginal mucosa are reached more easily by systemic than by topical treatment, relapse is likely to be avoided accordingly.

Presentation: white, flat, half-scored uncoated tablets marked "Janssen" on one side and K/200 on the reverse. Each tablet contains 200 mg ketoconazole. Dosage (for vaginal candidosis only): two tablets (400 mg) once daily for 5 days. For maximal absorption Nizoral should be taken with meals. Nizoral is contra-indicated in pregnancy. Precautions: the use of agents which reduce gastric acidity (anti-cholinergic drugs, antacids, H_2 -blockers) should be avoided and, if indicated, such drugs should be taken not less than 2 hours after Nizoral. Ketoconazole, when given together with cyclosporin A results in increased blood levels of cyclosporin A. It is important that blood levels of cyclosporin A are monitored if the two drugs are given concomitantly. Side-effects: nausea, skin rash, headache and pruritus may occasionally be observed. Alterations in liver function tests have occurred in patients on ketoconazole; these changes may be transient. Cases of hepatitis have been reported with an incidence of about 1 per 10,000 patients. Some of these may represent an idiosyncratic adverse reaction to the drug. This should be borne in mind in patients on long-term therapy. If a patient develops jaundice or any symptoms suggestive of hepatitis, treatment with ketoconazole should be stopped. Mild asymptomatic increases of liver enzyme levels, on the other hand, do not necessitate discontinuation of the treatment.

Sir Geoffrey Keynes, who died in July 1982 at the age of 95, was one of the great polymaths. His twin loves were medicine and surgery, on the one hand, and literature and the arts, on the other and he pursued both with equal success. He worked closely with the Nonesuch Press, editing several of its books, and it is therefore fitting that the Keynes Press should be named after him. Aimed primarily at reprinting classics with a medical interest published in the period of Keynes' life, the press pursues the same standards of scholarship and elegance that characterised the Nonesuch Press. Each book is specially edited and designed, and contains a commissioned introduction by an expert.

The Fatal Illness of Frederick the Noble by Morell Mackenzie. Introductions by Harold Ludman, consultant, ear, nose, and throat surgeon, King's College Hospital, and Jonathan Steinberg, fellow of Trinity Hall, Cambridge. Mackenzie's account of his part in the treatment of Crown Prince Frederick of Prussia for a tumour of the larynx, a case that, besides arousing violent disagreement about acceptable medical practice, historically had far reaching repercussions throughout Europe. The Medical Dictator by Major Greenwood. 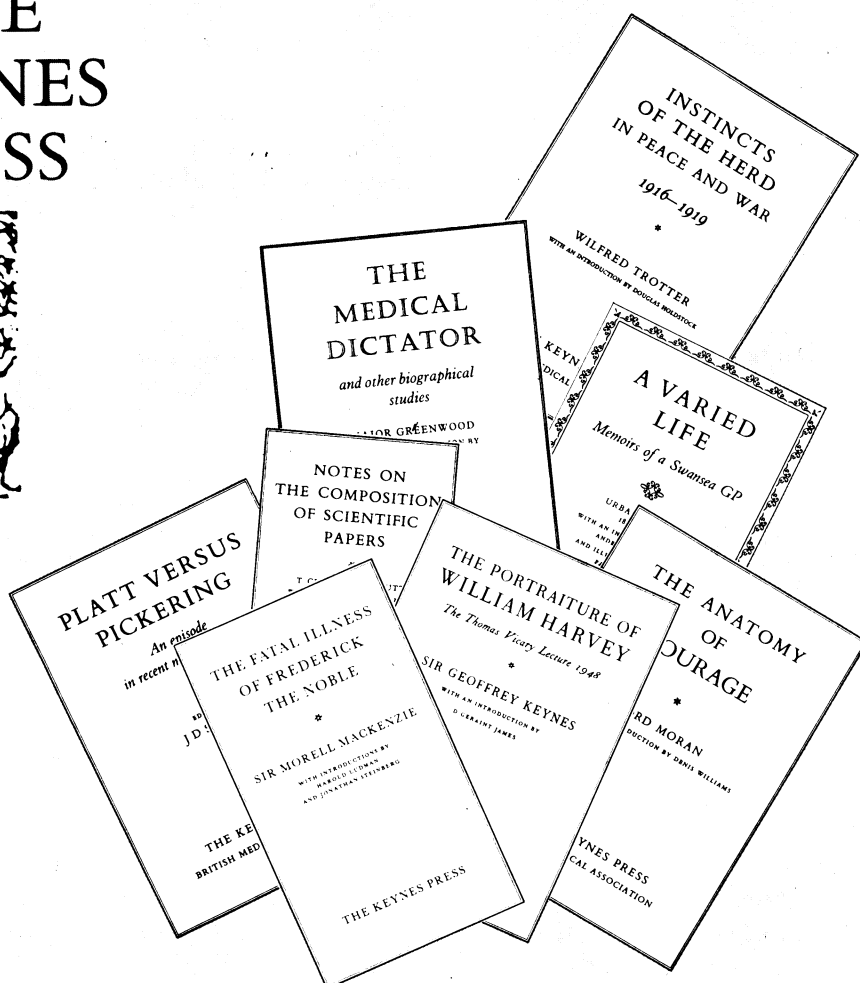
