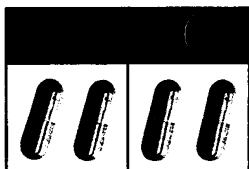

ABC OF CHILD ABUSE

Cruelty to children is common; every week at least four children in Britain will die as a result of abuse or neglect, and in England alone nearly 40,000 children are listed on child protection ("at risk") registers. The *ABC of Child Abuse* gives clear guidance on how to recognise child abuse—including the more recently identified forms such as sexual and emotional abuse and factitious illnesses—and on what to do when you suspect or know that it is occurring. Edited by Professor Roy Meadow, head of the department of paediatrics and child health, St James's University Hospital, Leeds, the book has contributions from paediatricians, child psychiatrists, a police surgeon, a social worker, a lawyer, and a victim. It should be read by everyone concerned with the care of children.

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Immunotherapy with monoclonal antibodies

7-13 April 1991, Cambridge

The aim of this course is to demonstrate the way that basic science can lead to the application of monoclonal antibodies in therapy. The programme will consist of lectures and discussions. Topics to be covered will include: ways of harnessing natural effector mechanisms to permit antibodies to kill target cells; targeting drugs, isotopes and toxins to tumour cells; engineering antibodies using recombinant DNA methods; bispecific antibodies to direct T-cells to tumours; antibodies as immunosuppressants; animal models of transplantation tolerance with monoclonal antibodies; monoclonal antibodies in the treatment of auto-immunity; monoclonal antibodies in bone-marrow transplantation; antibody therapy in lymphoma and leukaemia; avoiding antiglobulin responses.

The Director of Studies will be **Herman Waldmann, FRS**, Kay Kendall Professor of Therapeutic Immunology, University of Cambridge. The course is designed for basic scientists interested in the application of immunological knowledge to therapy; academic rheumatologists; clinical immunologists; academic transplantation physicians/surgeons and tumour immunologists. There are vacancies for 30 participants. Total fee £925 inclusive of accommodation.

The course sessions will take place at Downing College Cambridge where participants will be accommodated in single study-bedrooms. Bathroom facilities will be shared.

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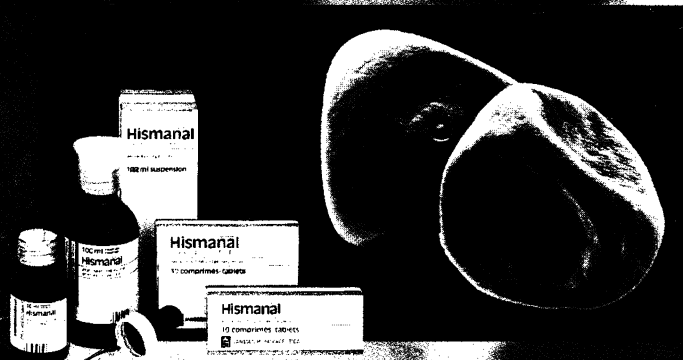
