Surgical Roots and Branches

by Sir Reginald Murley

When Sir Reginald Murley became president of the Royal College of Surgeons in July 1977 he was described in the *Daily Telegraph* as a "redoubtable standard bearer" and as "one of the dwindling number of old style 'surgical



characters'." In Surgical Roots and Branches he gives a lively account of the development of this character, from boyhood and student days at Barts to the six and a half years he spent in the "university of life"—as a medical officer in maxillofacial units in the second world war.

Sir Reginald has also been described as a "firebrand" with "political muscle." Not afraid to say what he thinks or to act on his beliefs, he has successfully fought many battles with the authorities over such issues as delay and inefficiency in



DID ED, BMJ, MURDER HIS WIFE?

upposedly based on rumoured events in the life of Ernest Hart, a great but undervalued editor of the BMJ, Frank Danby's novel Dr Philips, a Maide Vide Idyll was first published in 1887. Unlike many popular Victorian novels it is concisely plotted; the characters are sympathetic with believable; and the author's presentation of Jewish life in the last pineteerids bentary is uncompromisingly honest.

But is the character of "Dr Phillips" a powerist of Hart?
