

Warburton was the indefatigable chairman. This evidence occupies several folio volumes; and were these volumes in the hands of the profession generally, few would have the leisure to peruse them fully. It occurs to me that a well-digested and compendious abstract of this evidence, if now published, would find an extensive sale, and prove very useful. Hitherto the public have not had the benefit of such an abstract; and were it now produced, the great deficiency of evidence respecting the medical profession in the provinces would be apparent (*none* of this evidence having been printed, owing to the destruction of a *part* by the conflagration of the houses of parliament), and might be in some measure supplied by those provincial practitioners who appeared before the parliamentary committee alluded to.
