Every one at all conversant with the state of pharmacy in France and Germany will admit, that it is there in a state of progressive improvement, which is very imperfectly followed up in this country. Numberless most important and valuable preparations are there produced for the use of physicians and surgeons, to which the bulk of the Profession in this country are at present strangers. This conviction induced Mr. B. to spend several years in those countries, for the purpose of bringing home such contributions to the *Materia Medica* as had there been discovered and tested in practice, and of using his own endeavours to give an impulse to the subject which should lead to original investigations at home. The most obvious improvement, and one which must often have struck many medical men, was found in the Preparations of Iron in common use in France; and of these the Citrate, from its many valuable properties, appeared the most promising with which to commence his career as a chemist in London. An Advertisement having been put forth of an Ammonio-Citrate—certainly as an *imitation* of Mr. BULLOCK's Preparation—it is hardly necessary to caution the Profession that this, if truly described by its name, is an untried preparation in practice; and Mr. B. begs to suggest to the respectable firm whence that advertisement emanates, whether it would not be better to do something new for the Art than to mar the success of others by repeated imitations.
