MURRAY & ANOTHER

v.

TAGART.

An injunction was  
 granted on the 3rd of  
 March, 1842, by the  
 Honourable Court of  
 Chancery in England,  
 to restrain John Davis  
 Tagart, Chemist and

Druggist, of Cheltenham, from vending a spurious liquid,  
 which he, the said Tagart, sold as, and for "Sir James
