FROM PREFACE.

"The object of the author, in the following pages, is to lay before the student an outline of the theory and practice of medicine, unbiassed by attachment to any professed principle, and to delineate those views of pathology which appear to direct the reasonings, and to give a tone to the language, of medical writers at the

present period.

The demand for a fifth edition has afforded the author an opportunity of making some alterations in the work, which he hopes will give it additional value. The several diseases of the human body have been thrown into a new arrangement. The distinction between acute and chronic diseases has been abandoned, and a classification has been adopted better suited to the existing state of medical science. The formulæ medicamentorum scattered throughout the work have received some additions, and have everywhere been adapted to the nomenclature of the new London Pharmacopæia. Five new chapters have been added—namely, on Cachexia, Hypochondriasis, Cynanche Cellularis, Otitis, and Furuncular Inflammation. The results of the author's more recent experience have been incorporated into the text, and such other information introduced as appeared calculated for elementary instruction."

v.

TAGART.

An injunction was granted on the 3rd of March, 1842, by the Honourable Court of Chancery in England, to restrain John Davis Tagart, Chemist and
