Mary Ann Bull is the widow, and George Bull is a younger son, of the late Daniel Bull, a duly qualified medical man (Member of the Royal College of Surgeons, and Licentiate of the Apothecaries' Company), who died in November, 1852, having been disabled by paralysis during the last eight years of his life.

The father, mother, and eight children were in the greatest distress, when in 1851, an appeal was made to the profession on their behalf, which was generously responded to by subscriptions to the amount of between three and four hundred pounds. A weekly sum of money was given to the family up to the period of the father's death, when the sum of £300 was invested in the names of three gentlemen residing in Bedford, as trustees. The interest from this sum, and a small amount from life assurance, is now the sole income of the widow and family.

The appeal on behalf of this "distressing case" particularly aroused the sympathy of one gentleman, who lost no time in devising some means of relieving similar cases, and who has now the distinguished honour of having founded the "Medical Benevolent College."


