MEETING OF MEDICAL OFFICERS OF THE NORTHLEACH UNION. AT a meeting of the medical officers of the Northleach Union (Gloucestershire), held on the 27th February, at the King's Head, Northleach, it was resolved:—

1. That we are of opinion no payment per case will be satisfactory, unless a distinction be made between thickly and

thinly populated districts.

2. That the rates of payment for midwifery cases should be fixed according to distance—a guinea being the minimum beyond two miles.

3. That the Art. 177 in the Consolidated Order, should embrace a greater number of accidents, as many giving a great deal of trouble are omitted,—such as fractures of the cervicle,

ribs, pelvis, and skull.

4. That a representation should be made to the Poor-Law Board, that some remuneration ought to be allowed to the medical officers for the trouble and inconvenience they are subjected to in granting certificates of the cause of death, such certificate being considered absolutely essential by the Registrar-General for a correct statistical return of the cause of death, and can only be obtained through the profession in such form as can be relied on.

5. That this meeting is of opinion that the most satisfactory mode of payment in thinly populated and agricultural districts will be by an increase of salary, in proportion to the extent

of area.

6. That Mr. Bedwell be appointed Local Secretary, and that a subscription of five shillings quarterly be paid, if required, to defray incidental expenses.

7. That the thanks of the meeting are due to Mr. Griffin for his exertions on behalf of the union medical officers.


